Course goals:

After finishing the course the student shall;

...be able to show cross disciplinary understanding of different views of sustainable development and different ideologies in the field of environment and development...

...be able to critically analyse controversies, similarities and disagreements in the sustainable development debate by deriving different standpoints from presumptions and views on humans, nature, development, technology and economy...

...be able to use discourse analyses as a tool to understand the debate and practical applications of the concept of sustainable development...

Examination

To complete the course you need to:

- Attend the seminars (if you miss a seminar please do the posted extra task, if you miss more than one seminar, please contact me). The conference is also mandatory (Thursday-Friday).
- Turn in a minor assignment and contribute to the literature-seminar on the book "Climate Wars" by Harald Weltzer on the afternoon March 30th
- Turn in a minor assignment relating to the book "Dawn over Kalahari" by Lasse Berg

- Complete the final assignment (individual) and participate in the role play (group).
